Introduction

The Directors, who are the charity trustees for the purposes of Charity Law, have pleasure in presenting their annual report and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2018.

The directors are satisfied with the performance of the charity during the year and the position at 31st December 2018 and consider that the charity is in a strong position to continue its activities during the coming year, and that the charity's assets are adequate to fulfil its obligations.

Objectives and Activities of the Charity

Summary of main activities and achievment of the charity in relation to its objects during the year

The objectives of the charity are to provide young people in Scotland with opportunities to advance their education and participation in creative expression and sport. These are achieved by providing support and access to tuition, scholarships, awards, and materials in the various creative arts, including but not limited to art, music, writing, and drama, as well as sporting activities. We work with local schools and recognised youth organisations to ensure both need and talent are equally considered and assisted.

Summary of main activities and achievment of the charity in relation to its objects during the year (cont)

Falkirk Area

Larbert High School, Kiran's former secondary school, is a positive and proactive outlet for Kiran's Trust to support creative arts education. Four school prizes are awarded each year (£25 voucher, along with trophies valued at £17 each) in the subjects of creative art and design, music, photography and creative writing. A three-year scholarship is also awarded to support a creative design/art pupil (monies increase each year through to sixth year with the potential to assist if students go on to study design/art at college.) The fourth scholarship student is in his final year. We also sponsor the music department's School of Pop and Rock, donating £200 for the purchase of a full suite of music books. The school is now an accredited Trinity College exam centre.

Under the management of Karen McCabe, the following Primary Schools were awarded monies (totalling £400) for creative arts and physical education activities: Westquarter, Laurieston, Nethermains, Bowhouse, Carronshore, Bainsford, and Bonnybridge. Bainsford celebrated their 40th anniversary with a pupil art show (pictured), using the monies for presentation and publicity.



Forth Valley Sensory Centre received £200 to support their arts and crafts group.

In growing our support for sporting activities, we sponsored two awards (£100) at the 3rd Annual Sports Awards for Larbert High School and Tryst Community Sports Club (TCSC). These recognised the TCSC Coach of the Year and Game Changer.

Falkirk Area (cont)

At Central Taekwondo Academy, where Kiran trained and competed, we support young people in their advancement in the sport of Taekwondo. The Kiran Martin Taekwondo Ambassador received £500, and the Cadet and Junior Teams received £1,300. These monies provided eight athletes the opportunity to train and travel to national and international competitions. Jordyn Smith, Ambassador, became Junior World Champion in April 2018 (pictured) and is competing with Team GB working on qualification for the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo. The Kiran Martin Indomitable Spirit Prize was awarded (£50 to spend on Taekwondo equipment) along with an engraved nameplate for the trophy (donated by LECS Upholstery) to recognise an individual committed to the sport of Taekwondo but who does not participate at a competition level.

Fife/Pittenweem Area

Pittenweem Primary School maintain a Kiran Martin fund using it to award an annual prize for the most creative student as selected by school staff and support any creative programme(s) they choose to undertake. The school receives £50 annually.

Edinburgh Area

Kiran's Trust continued its sponsorship of £1,000 for the Magic School at the Edinburgh International Magic Festival (MagicFest) as their charity partner. In addition to workshops held during the Festival this year, Magic School went on the road to St Francis Primary School and Niddrie Mains Primary School.



Edinburgh Young Carers took creative expression to new realms in 2018, working with MagicFest and Professor Richard Wiseman to develop the exhibition Now You See It, Now You Don't. Showing at the National Storytelling Centre, it was an amazing collection of photos taken around Edinburgh (pictured). We supported their wardrobe and transportation costs (£600).



Two Kiran Martin Awards for Creative Writing were again presented by Wester Hailes Education Centre—one junior and one senior student received a £25 gift card and a trophy (valued at £17).

Through Space Artworks, we assisted a young artist (pictured) with £458 towards his exhibition at the Out of the Blue Christmas market. Sarah Galliers from Space Artworks said, "The aim was to help build confidence, enhance skills, engage with customers, and learn about display and to provide him with an income from his artwork and develop his professional practice."

Edinburgh Area (cont)

We continued our partnership with Fruitmarket Gallery sponsoring (£1,355) traditional and inventive art materials for a suite of workshops for different age groups. Over 4,500 children and young people attend these activities.

National

Kiran's Trust sponsored the trophies for the Scottish Taekwondo Championships which featured UK and international competitors. Their cost was £204.

The Scottish Young Carers Festival received £840 for performances by magician Billy Reid. This year there were two events, one in Avimore the other in Fife, to allow more young carers to have the respite, consultation, and the fun they deserve.

In 2018, we had 16 friends (a minimum £10 donation), of which four make a recurring monthly payment to Kiran's Trust.

The directors recognise the importance of diversifying the ways in which we raise funds and as such have a variety of platforms available. There is a Kiran's Trust "shop" on ebay, where we sell new or second hand items donated to us. Kiran's Trust is also actively using EasyFundraising as well as AmazonSmile for people to support us while doing their normal online shopping. MyDonate is our online donation platform for one off and recurring donations and fundraising pages.

The Kiran's Trust website (www.kiranstrust.org) provides information regarding the charity, about Kiran (and some of her artwork), objectives and funding, upcoming fundraising events and access to newsletters and company reports. The Gallery section provides past and current scholars a location to display their work. Additional information outlets are provided via direct mail/email of newsletters and Twitter.

The directors express their gratitude to the many individuals who have become Friends, made donations, and attended or supported fundraising events. The directors also wish to acknowledge the following companies for their donations, services and prizes to the benefit of fundraising events or awards: IDEAS and LECS Upholstery (Falkirk area); Wm Christie and Sons, Cork and Cask, St Vincent Bar, and bia bistrot (Edinburgh).

Plans for future periods

The Directors and registered office have relocated again and being in central Scotland allows for closer contact with the primary giving locations as well as opportunity to expand as required/desired. During the past couple of years, the Directors have chosen to prioritise establishing a solid giving base. In 2019 it will be the tenth anniversary for which planning is ongoing with the focus on fundraising and celebration.

Structure, Governance and Management

Nature of the Governing Document and constitution of the charity

Kiran's Trust is a company limited by guarantee, and is governed by the regulations set out in the memorandum and articles of association, incorporated on 15 September 2009, and is recognised as a charity by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator.

The directors meet in person for an annual general meeting and conduct business throughout the year via email, videoconference and in person as required. The directors, on behalf of Kiran's Trust, award prizes, scholarships and support in the area of creative arts, design, music and writing, and for participation in Taekwondo. The recipients are selected by the administrative staff within those organisations to which Kiran's Trust provides support.

Training of Directors/Trustees

Directors' training in developments affecting the charity's areas of activity is addressed as part of the directors' meetings.

All directors are familiar with the work of the charity. If there are any areas where additional training is required this would be discussed at a directors' meeting and a suitable solution identified.

The major risks to which the charity is exposed and reviews and systems to mitigate risks

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operation and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate their exposure.

Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund.

Transactions and Financial position

The financial statements are set out on pages 12 to 17. As stated in the introduction to this report, the trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the year to have been satisfactory.

The Statement of Financial Activities show net incoming resources for the year of £4,870 (prior year £12,983). The resources expended were £9,792 (prior year £13,298), giving a deficit of £4,922 (prior year deficit £315).

The total reserves at the year end stand at £29,683 (prior year £34,605).

Free unrestricted reserves amounted to £24,333 (prior year £29,355). These reserves are held to ensure that the company's commitments to their scholarships and prizes are able to be fulfilled until such time as additional funding can be put in place.

The designated reserves amounted to £5,350 (prior year £5,250). These are set aside for use during the next financial year to ensure that commitments are met.

1 Accounting policies Basis of preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Revised 2005), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement, on the grounds that it is a small company.

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

Incoming Resources and resources expended

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred.

Governance costs include the general running expenses of the company and consist mainly of those relating to statutory requirements.

Investment Income

Bank Interest received is included on an actual receipts basis.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Funds structure policy

Funds are classified as either restricted or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the directors' discretion to apply the fund.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, other than that described above.

2 Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.
