Objectives and Activities of the Charity


Summary of main activities and achievment of the charity in relation to its objects during the year

The objectives of the charity are to provide young people in Scotland with opportunities to advance their education and participation in creative expression and sport. These are achieved by providing support and access to tuition, scholarships, awards, and materials in the various creative arts, including but not limited to art, music, writing, and drama, as well as sporting activities. We work with local schools and recognised youth organisations to ensure both need and talent are equally considered and assisted.

Summary of main activities and achievment of the charity in relation to its objects during the year (cont)

2019 marked the 10th anniversary of Kiran's Trust. It is a milestone the Directors are very proud of along with the support and achievements of everyone who has been associated with us throughout this period. The graphic below was included in our tenth birthday newsletter and depicts the depth and breadth of our work.



Falkirk Area

Larbert High School, Kiran's former secondary school, is a positive and proactive outlet for Kiran's Trust to support creative arts education. Four school prizes are awarded each year (£25 voucher, along with trophies valued at £17 each) in the subjects of creative art and design, music, photography and creative writing. A three-year scholarship is also awarded to support a creative design/art pupil (monies increase each year through to sixth year with the potential to assist if students go on to study design/art at college.) This year marked the fifth scholarship to be awarded with the recipient receiving £100. The fourth scholarship recipient chose to continue his education in creative arts and was awarded £300. A music scholarship was created with £50 going towards the cost of music exams.

Under the management of Karen Hill, the following Primary Schools were awarded monies (totalling £450) for creative arts and physical education activities: Westquarter, Laurieston, Nethermains, Bowhouse, Carronshore, Bainsford, Larbert Village, Maddiston and Bonnybridge.

Summary of main activities and achievment of the charity in relation to its objects during the year (cont) Falkirk Area (cont)

As part of our support for sporting activities, we sponsored three awards (£150) at the 4th Annual Sports Awards for the Tryst Community Sports Club (TCSC). These recognised the TCSC Coach of the Year, Game Changer and Sports Personality of the Year. A former Kiran's Trust Taekwondo scholar, Asia Bailey, presented the awards (see also Future Plans section). Asia is pictured with Tasha (a current Kiran's Trust Taekwondo scholar) receiving the Sports Personality award.



Carrongrange received two parcels of funding in 2019. The first was to purchase wireless headset microphones to use in their music and drama performances (£600). The second supported two activities: a drama project with Tenderhooks who work with some of the most profound and complex young people providing a sensory theatre experience; and a music project with Drake Music to make the curriculum more accessible to pupils with additional special needs using their Finger Notes programme.

Forth Valley Sensory Centre received £200 to support their arts and crafts group.

Summary of main activities and achievment of the charity in relation to its objects during the year (cont) Falkirk Area (cont)

At Central Taekwondo Academy, where Kiran trained and competed, we support young people in their advancement in the sport. The Kiran Martin Taekwondo Ambassador received £300, and the Cadet and Junior Teams received £1,300. These monies provided nine athletes the opportunity to train and travel with GB Taekwondo.



Jordyn Smith, Ambassador, is competing with GB Taekwondo for Olympic qualification. Unfortunately, she suffered an injury and is now targeting the 2024 Olympics in Paris. The Kiran Martin Indomitable Spirit Prize was awarded (£50 to spend on Taekwondo equipment) along with an engraved nameplate for the trophy (donated by LECS Upholstery) to recognise an individual committed to the sport of Taekwondo but who does not participate at a competition level.

Fife/Pittenweem Area

Pittenweem Primary School maintain a Kiran Martin fund to award an annual prize for the most creative student as selected by school staff and support any creative programme(s) they choose to undertake. They did not require additional funds this year.

Edinburgh Area

Kiran's Trust continued its sponsorship of £1,000 for the Magic School at the Edinburgh International Magic Festival (MagicFest) as their charity partner. This year the sessions went 'on the road' being held at six Primary Schools throughout the area reaching 350 students, as well as at Carrongrange School (Grangemouth).



Kiran's Trust was also a funding partner with MagicFest's work with Rock Trust, a charity for youth homelessness in Scotland (£500). The young people developed and presented an exhibition of photographic illusions called The Power of Perspective. The exhibition was aimed at raising awareness of young people at risk of or experiencing homelessness.

Edinburgh Young Carers held two family-focussed festive events this year (£500). The first was a family meal where eight young carers and their families ate together and then went to the Lyceum Theatre to see A Christmas Carol. The second event gave 20 young carers and their families exclusive access to Clown Around providing fun and respite in a safe atmosphere.

A young person was funded (£50) to learn creative and life sewing skills with Best Bib N Tucker.

Two Kiran Martin Awards for Creative Writing were again presented by Wester Hailes Education Centre—one junior and one senior student received a £25 gift card and a trophy (valued at £17).

We continued our partnership with Fruitmarket Gallery sponsoring (£1,600) traditional and inventive art materials for their engagement programmes for different age groups. These included Making Matters, SmART Thinking, youth outreach, family sessions and Art in a Bag.

National

Kiran's Trust sponsored the trophies for the Scottish Taekwondo Championships featuring UK and international competitors. Their cost was £233.

The Scottish Young Carers Festival received £350 for a performance by magician Billy Reid at their festival this year.

Another young writer was supported in conjunction with the Scottish Book Trust for the What's Your Story programme (£1200).

Fundraising and Sponsors

In 2019, we had 16 friends (a minimum £10 donation), of which four make a recurring monthly payment to Kiran's Trust.

The directors recognise the importance of diversity in how we raise funds and as such have a variety of platforms available. There is a Kiran's Trust 'shop' on eBay (Paypal), where we sell new or secondhand items donated to us. Kiran's Trust is also actively using EasyFundraising and AmazonSmile for people to support us while doing their normal online shopping. Virgin Money Giving is our online donation platform for one-off and recurring donations and fundraising pages.

The Kiran's Trust website (www.kiranstrust.org) provides information regarding the charity, about Kiran (and some of her artwork), objectives and funding, upcoming fundraising events, and access to newsletters and company reports. The Gallery section provides past and current scholars a location to display their work. Additional information outlets are provided via direct mail/email of newsletters and Twitter.

The directors express their gratitude to the many individuals who have become Friends, made donations, and attended or supported fundraising events. The directors also wish to acknowledge the following companies for their donations, services, and prizes to the benefit of fundraising events or awards: BP Andrew and RSRUK Fulmar (Aberdeen); IDEAS and LECS Upholstery (Falkirk); Jen Marr Racing, Wm Christie and Sons, St. Vincent Bar, and bia bistrot (Edinburgh).

Plans for future periods

In 2019, Kiran's Trust were also selected to be a recipient of funds from BP North Sea's C2C12. This is a coast-to-coast road cycling event in 2020, from which the proceeds will provide a sound financial basis for Kiran's Trust to continue its activities.

Former Taekwondo scholar and Ambassador, Asia Bailey, is back with Kiran's Trust helping the Directors with various duties and learning how a charity functions.

Structure, Governance and Management

Nature of the Governing Document and constitution of the charity

Kiran's Trust is a company limited by guarantee, and is governed by the regulations set out in the memorandum and articles of association, incorporated on 15 September 2009, and is recognised as a charity by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator.

The directors meet in person for an annual general meeting and conduct business throughout the year via email, videoconference and in person as required. The directors, on behalf of Kiran's Trust, award prizes, scholarships and support in the area of creative arts, design, music and writing, and for participation in Taekwondo. The recipients are selected by the administrative staff within those organisations to which Kiran's Trust provides support.

Training of Directors/Trustees

Directors' training in developments affecting the charity's areas of activity is addressed as part of the directors' meetings.

All directors are familiar with the work of the charity. If there are any areas where additional training is required this would be discussed at a directors' meeting and a suitable solution identified.

The major risks to which the charity is exposed and reviews and systems to mitigate risks

The directors have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operation and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate their exposure.

Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund.

Transactions and Financial position

The financial statements are set out on pages 12 to 17. As stated in the introduction to this report, the trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the year to have been satisfactory.

The Statement of Financial Activities show net incoming resources for the year of £4,055 (prior year £4,870). The resources expended were £10,550 (prior year £9,792), giving a deficit of £6,495 (prior year deficit £4,922).

The total reserves at the year end stand at £23,188 (prior year £29,683).

Free unrestricted reserves amounted to £18,088 (prior year £24,333). These reserves are held to ensure that the company's commitments to their scholarships and prizes are able to be fulfilled until such time as additional funding can be put in place.

The designated reserves amounted to £5,100 (prior year £5,350). These are set aside for use during the next financial year to ensure that commitments are met.

Share Capital

The company is limited by guarantee and therefore has no share capital.

Independent Examiner's Report to the trustees of the charity on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31 December 2019

1 Accounting policies Basis of preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Revised 2005), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement, on the grounds that it is a small company.

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

Incoming Resources and resources expended

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred.

Governance costs include the general running expenses of the company and consist mainly of those

Investment Income

Bank Interest received is included on an actual receipts basis.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Funds structure policy

Funds are classified as either restricted or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the directors' discretion to apply the fund.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, other than that described above.

2 Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.
